TREASURY DEPARTMENT, Sept. 30, 1790.

IT is hereby made known that the following arrangement has been adopted towards carrying into execution the Act making provision for the debt of the United States, viz.

Loan Office Certificates, and those issued by the Commissioners for the adjustment of accounts in the several States, will be receivable only at the Treasury and by the respective Commissioners of Loans within the States in which they were respectively issued. The Certificates issued by the Register of the Treasury, by the Pay Master General and Commissioner of Army Accounts, by the Commissioners for the adjustment of the Accounts of the Quartermasters' Commissary's Hospital, Clothing, and Marine Departments, Indians of Interest, and Bills of old Emulsion, will be receivable indiscriminately at the Treasury and by the Commissioners of all the States. The situation of the Checks has dictated this arrangement for the greater safety of the public against impositions by forged or counterfeit paper, and the details which have been adopted from the same consideration for the execution of the business are such, that it will give facility and dispatch, if applications from the Holders of Certificates of the Register of the Treasury, and of the Pay Master General, and Commissioner of Army Accounts, and of the Commissioners of the five Departments aforesaid, are made in like manner to the Commissioners of Loans within the States in which they were issued, Transfers can afterwards be made to any office that the Proprietors of these Certificates may desire, that it shall be.
